Bellefontaine high school's debate team went undereated and captured first place in the District No .18 tournament at Marysville Saturday.





er told the graduates they should pack a healthy body, and take care of it throughout their journey, because it will last a life time.


Commenting they will find the trip hard, Dr. Boggs, then proposed they include a sense of humor, especially the ability to laugh at oneself.


The Senior Class of BHS has finished the plans for its assembly and other senior activities for the end of a fine high school record. The committees and their chairman are as follows:

Gold keys will be given the top two scholars of the Senior class by Key Club. The club will also inscribe the names of these people on a plaque, which contains the names of past top scholars.


The international Key Club convention will be held in New York in July and the B.H.S. organization plans to send one delegate.
